1. **A MESSAGE FROM THE ARMY OF THE VALLEY OF VIRGINIA.** Broadside. Richmond 1865. 1 page. P&W 1599. C-698 Camp of Smith's Brigade: February 10, 1865 Broadside, 6" x 9 3/8". Responding to the Conference at Hampton Roads between President Lincoln and Confederate Vice President Stephens, several Regiments of Smith's Brigade resolve "unanimously" that, "after four years of terrible war with the savage foe who seeks our subjection, we are still firm in our determination to achieve our independence or to perish nobly struggling for it." We will "hail with joy" a "peace which brings to us the recognition of our independence and assigns us our proper place in the family of nations." But "we cast from us with scorn the arrogant and insolent propositions recently made to our Commissioners by Abraham Lincoln." At the Conference Lincoln had made clear, to the dismay of both Stephens and Horace Greeley, the New York Tribune editor who had instigated the meeting, that peace could occur only by the Confederacy's surrender, restoration of the Union, and adherence to the Emancipation Proclamation. Fine, crisp copy, lower blank margin slightly tanned, the best copy we've seen. We've seen only one other copy offered recently and that inferior to this copy at \$2,000. A "joint resolution in relation to the war" reminding citizens of the difficult struggle: "no sacrifice of life or fortune can be too costly." Believed to have been written by J.L.M. Curry. First edition, housed in 1/2 leather folding box, minor waterstains to box, spine stamped in gold, also stamped in gold "Ex Libris S. W. Kaiserman," minor foxing otherwise crisp and fine, "Rebel Archives" stamp; a plus. \$250.00

As recorded in a bound volume of pamphlets, broadsides, proof sheets, and contemporary news clippings, many of the items annotated by William Curtis Noyes, one of the delegates. 53 separately printed items as described below, and 15 pages of newspaper clippings bound together. Noyes' attractive bookplate. Full leather, hinges taped from inside. Red black leather spines and labels stamped in gold. \$2,500.00

 - Report made to the General Assembly of the State of Rhode Island, at Their January Session, , 1861, By the Commissioners on the Part of the State. To the Convention of Commissioners from the Several States, Held, at the Request of Virginia, at Washington, on the Fourth Day of February, 1861. Providence, RI 1861. 9 pages.
 - Reports of the Select Committee of Thirty-Three on the Disturbed Condition of the Country. Washington, DC 1861. 71 pages. Noyes's ownership signature at the head of the title page. In the final months of 1860, the House committee worked on issues related to the expansion of slavery, hoping to avoid war.
 - Bound ahead of these seven publications are 46 proof sheets, gatherings, or broadsides used by the delegates in their daily work, 36 of which bear Noyes's ownership signature and date (20 to 26 February, 1861, as the conference wound down), 16 bearing his annotations, many extensive and substantive, including vote tallies on individual proposals. Among these items are resolutions of state legislatures appointing their representatives (Kentucky, Missouri, New Jersey, Tennessee, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Delaware, New York, Indiana, and Illinois), a list of the delegates by state, "Rules of Order" for the conference, 30 proposals submitted by various delegates, and four separate printings, each a revision, of a "Report of Committee." The 1861 Peace Conference was "called by the Virginia legislature in an attempt to satisfy the states of the far South on the slavery issue. Twenty-one states were represented, with the border states most active. The seven states which had already seceded did not send delegates. Ex-president Tyler of Virginia, chosen president of the Convention, stated its purpose, "to bring back the cotton states and thereby restore the Constitution and the Union of the States." The recommendations, submitted to Congress on 27 February 1861, constituted the last attempt at conciliation on the slavery question in the territories" (Dictionary of American History). Of course, they were rejected. Noyes (1805-1864), a prominent attorney whose bookplate appears on the front pastedown of this volume, was a delegate to the convention from New York who "labored to harmonize conflicting views between the sections" (DAB). The beginning point for the conference was the Crittenden Compromise, defeated in Congress in December, 1861, that had been presented by Kentucky Senator J. J. Crittenden, providing six articles proposed to the United States Constitution, each in some way codifying various aspects of slavery and its expansion into the territories. The proof sheets, with Noyes's annotations, reveal the conference's unsuccessful attempts to make them palatable to parties already galvanized in opposite directions.

9. Baquet, Camille **HISTORY OF THE FIRST BRIGADE, NEW JERSEY VOLUNTEERS FROM 1861 TO 1865.** Trenton, State of New Jersey 1910. 515 pages. First edition, a presentation copy from Sergeant John P. Beech copious annotations and corrections in his hand who received the Medal of Honor for conspicuous gallantry at the Bloody Angle and Spotsylvania. The presentation read: "With compliments of John P. Beech Upon this the 50th Anniversary of the battle of Gettysburg fought July 1, 2nd, 3rd, 1863." The annotations equal over a page of single-spaced typewritten text including Beech's complete transcript of his recommendation for recognition for gallantry. There are notes on 40 pages, pictures and the endsheets. Beech felt strongly that Baquet hadn't done a creditable job in his history, under the frontis of the author Beech wrote, "The Author not being an original member of the brigade and failing to pay particular attention to the data furnished him by those who were has made numerous mistakes in the work hence the underlinings and notations. Includes an account of the soldiers home with a description of the relics ensconced therein, including the human ones, there are muster rolls for Maryland regiments, plus the names, street addresses (as of the date of publication), rank, and branch of service of the members of the society of the Army and Navy of the Confederate states in the state of Maryland, an interesting and useful volume especially considering the addresses. First edition, interior tight and clean, lower cover of one add page cleanly excised, cover slightly soiled, gold stamping bright, inner front hinge starting but quite tight. It was edited by the able Marcus J. Wright who listed himself as, "Agent of the War Department for the Collection of Confederate Records," I.E. Official Records compiler; associate editor Ben LaBree. The journal was similar to its rival the Confederate Veteran. 8 1/2" X 11" format, many illustrations, first-hand accounts, veteran affairs and humor. The front wraps of each issue portrayed a Confederate worthy. In direct competition with and ultimately eclipsed by the better known Confederate Veteran magazine, the Confederate War Journal enjoyed only a short-lived, two-year run before it was overcome by the Veterans' popularity and became itself "a lost cause." Bound volume of all twelve issues of Volume I of this excellent monthly periodical with its uniquely Southern perspective. April 1893 through March 1895. 32. Garesche, Louis **BIOGRAPHY OF LIEUT. COL. JULIUS P. GARESCHE Assistant Adjutant-General.** Philadelphia 1887. 505 pages. Garesche, an Asst. Adjt. Gen., was killed at Murfreesboro. Scarce biography of a Catholic officer; some war and lots of Catholicism. Frontis is a full-length portrait of Garesche in uniform, 2 full page illustrations on heavy paper. First edition, Garesche, a good Catholic, was appointed Lt. Col. and assigned to the 14th Army Corps. He was Chief of Staff under Rosecrans, however his service was brief. He reported for duty on the 13th of November, 1862 and was killed in the Battle of Stones River on December 31st. This title is enhanced with some very vivid descriptions of Garesche's head disappearing when it was struck by a cannonball. Interior tight and clean, spine lettering bright, slightly scuffed. This copy belonged to and is signed on the front fly by Zebulon Bates Tower. We find no copies on the market. Protected by a clear acid-free mylar dust jacket . \$250.00
